Freedom of a Christian



It is almost the 4th of July and thus is time for my annual newsletter article on Luther's *On the Freedom of a Christian*. This is the time of the year (when we aren't in a pandemic) when we parade around celebrating our freedom. As American's we talk and believe in terms of freedom often, but I don't know how often we think about what the word freedom truly means.

Most of the time we talk about our "freedom from." Mostly that we are free from the government telling us what to believe and how to behave. What I don't hear is our "freedom to." Luther writes in 1520 in On the Freedom of a Christian that, "A Christian is an utterly free man, lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is an utterly dutiful man, servant of all, subject to all." This profound statement reminds us that in our freedom from earthly dominions, we are called into our freedom to one another.

Christian freedom isn't about individual freedom, because Christianity isn't focused on individualism. In our baptism we are called into community with one another connected to one another through the Holy Spirit. When any one of us suffers, the whole body suffers. In our Christian Freedom we are free to act out against injustice, to work to help the most vulnerable in our society, to heal the sick, and set the captives free. Hopefully this sounds redundant because we hear this message in scripture over and over again, but this was not always the reality for the religious in our world. There have been civil religious laws that restricted people from caring for the unclean since they would become unclean themselves. There have been civil laws that prevent people from feeding the hungry in our country today. Freedom as we often talk about it pales in comparison to the freedom experienced in Christ. This 4th of July I invite you to reflect on what it means to experience the freedom of Christ in your life.

Re: Camp Preparation & Travel

COVID-19 changed much in our lives and world. As we prepare to welcome you to camp this summer, we need your help to minimize the risk of infection by following the recommendations below prior to and while attending camp. If you have any illness symptoms before departing for camp, please do not board the bus or travel up to camp until they clear and you have spoken with me.

For 2 weeks prior to arriving at camp:

Please take and record your temperature daily, and bring that log with you to camp. Minimize your exposure to others by staying at home as much as possible and avoiding large group activities (more than 10), and wearing a facemask when you do go out.

While at camp and/or riding the bus:

Wear a facemask, and bring another with you. We do have a good supply up here, but not enough for all guests all summer.

If you can, please bring your own bottle of hand sanitizer.

Summer staff have followed the same process before they arrived, and commit to spending the entire summer up at camp and not heading to town during breaks.

Our Park County Health Department and camp physician believe that having both staff and guests follow these protocols will greatly minimize the risk of COVID-19 transmission, and will help all campers to arrive at camp healthy and ready to go. We understand they involve some sacrifice on your part, and may affect other summer plans or activities.

As you know all too well, this is no ordinary time. We take these steps in addition to following all other reopening guidelines (local, state, American Camping Association, etc.) as we prepare for the season. Our hope is that by all doing these things we can feel confident everyone is healthy and ready for camp.

Remember to pray for the staff and campers.
